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
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The Forum on Education Abroad Conferences in Athens

This October, College Year in Athens (CYA) hosted the <u>7th Forum on Education Abroad</u> <u>Europe, Middle East, and Africa (EMEA)</u> <u>Conference</u>, a key event in the international education landscape. Taking place from October 16-18, 2024 at the Athens Conservatoire, this biennial conference brought together academic and institutional leaders from three continents to discuss the future of international education, with a particular focus on community-engaged learning, sustainability, and student well-being in the Mediterranean region.

In addition to the EMEA Conference, the **Careers**, **Internships, and Global Learning (CIGL) Conference** was held from October 13-15, 2024. This event emphasized the importance of career-

Group Site Visit (Oct. 13-16): On the occasion of the EMEA Conference, CYA invited Study Abroad Directors from U.S. universities to Athens for a Group Site Visit. On October 13, CYA staff and faculty welcomed participants to the rooftop of the CYA Academic Center, offering stunning sunset views of the Acropolis that sparked connections and conversations.

During their stay, attendees explored Athens' historical treasures, including the Ancient Agora and the Trireme, guided by CYA faculty Yiannis Karavas. They also joined CYA faculty Athena Hadji's class at the National Museum of Contemporary Art, and participated in a workshop titled (Re)defining 'Duty of Care': Strategies for Cultivating Inclusive Campus Cultures, facilitated by CYA faculty Aimee Placas and CYA Student Affairs Advisor Jennifer Holland. This workshop focused on strategies to address divisiveness and conflict while fostering inclusivity and well-being in study abroad environments. Each experience was thoughtfully designed to foster collaboration and inspire a deeper appreciation for the CYA student experience.

Pharos 3.0 "Capacity-Building and Networking Program for Greek and U.S. Education Institutions and Organizations" Summit (October 16): This summit was organized by **The Forum** on Education Abroad, with the support of the U.S. Embassy in Athens, funded through a Study Abroad Engagement Grant of the U.S. Department of State and hosted by CYA. Pharos 3.0 fostered connections between Greek and U.S. higher education institutions and explored opportunities for short-term study programs in Greece, CYA Executive Chair, Alexis Phylactopoulos participated in a panel on Education Abroad Provider Organizations: A Key Partner in the U.S. Higher Education Internationalization Landscape, moderated by Dr. Marissa Lombardi, Vice President and Chief Learning Officer, The Forum on Education Abroad.

During the EMEA Conference, CYA faculty Aimee Placas and Peggy Myresiotou, CYA's Vice President for Administration, joined Anders Larsen and lan Terkildsen from DIS Scandinavia for a panel discussion titled *Towards a New Study Abroad Model: Cultural Triangulation.* The session highlighted the innovative collaboration between CYA and DIS, bridging Northern and Southern Europe and moving beyond the traditional home-and-abroad comparison to create a triangulated cultural perspective.

CYA hosted a workshop on Afro-Greeks of Avato

On September 25, CYA hosted an insightful workshop titled "Uncovering Hidden Stories: The Afro-Greeks* of Avato." presented by the artist duo Latent Community (Sotiris Tsiganos and Ionian Bisai). The workshop brought together 18 participants including Fall '24 semester students, members of the CYA community, and visitors from the general public, to explore the intricate history and lived experiences of the black-Greek community residing in Avato, a remote town in northern Greece.

One key focus of the workshop was the artists' exploration of the "politics of memory"—how historical narratives are constructed and the challenges faced by the black-Greek community in being recognized

as a part of the nation's cultural fabric. Another part of the discussion was the relationship between representation, racial identity, and historical erasure in modern Greece.


HELLENIC EXECUTIVE PROGRAM

This day-long symposium featured 10 original papers presented by eminent scholars in the field, including CYA faculty members John Karavas, Nikos Tsivikis, and Angelos Papadopoulos.

Workshops

Three workshops took place at CYA during the Fall 2024 semester. In October, Dr. **Thanos Dokos** organized four meetings for our students under the title *"Understanding the Evolving Crisis in The Middle East"*. This workshop focused on the current regional security environment and the dynamics and consequences of the evolving crises in Gaza, the The presentations explored the cultural impact and enduring legacy of ancient Greek athletics, offering fresh perspectives on its historical and societal impact.

The conference, chaired by CYA faculty member **Robert Pitt** and made possible through the generous support of Professor **Hara Tzavella-Evjen**, was open to the wider CYA community. Attendees participated both in person and online.

In collaboration with the **Athens Conservatoire**, a cross-disciplinary workshop series *"Ancient Drama: A Present Experience"* was organized in November, delivered by four Conservatoire instructors. Its objective was to bridge ancient drama with modern experience through movement, rhythm, voice and dramaturgy. CYA instructors **Stella Papayanni** and **Lida Triantafilidou** are currently running a specialized workshop on Modern Greek Language, allowing students to discover the joy of Greek language through theatrical drama techniques.

Lectures

In terms of public outreach, on November 20, CYA had the pleasure to accommodate **Dr. Scarlett Kingsley**, Associate Professor of Classics at Agnes Scott College, Elizabeth A. Whitehead Distinguished Scholar at the American School of Classical Studies at Athens (ASCSA) who delivered a fascinating lecture on *"The Perils of Agrarianism: The Breakdown of the Hoplite-* Farmer in the Fifth Century BCE". In this lecture, Dr. Kingsley illustrated the conceptual opposition of the spear and the plough in the fifth century BCE and argued that Cyrus' words represent Persia's recommitment to an imperial, militaristic identity and that this resonates with the Histories' (by Herodotus) presentation of the nascent imperialist Athenians.



Back to Athens after 50 years: A journey through time with CYA

"So, this is your first visit to CYA after 50 years?" asked CYA President **Theoni Scourta**. "You must see so many changes," she added. My wife **Lynn** and I had the pleasure of visiting the school in September 2024.

Indeed, I have seen many changes since my student days in the spring of 1972. As **Billy Simopoulos**, CYA Development Officer, very kindly escorted us around the facilities, I had time to reflect on the school's evolution. I left with the impression that 1972 was an inflection point in the history of the school and Greece. More on this later. Let me first describe what led me to CYA.

Like so many CYA students, I have a love of history and had applied to CYA to study archaeology and anthropology. I was one of 104 students that year. On many days, the streets had a modest level of traffic and smog obscured the Acropolis. Our classes were held at the Hellenic American Union. Our apartment was in the Kolonaki area, and I had two roommates, **Steven Rales (SP '72)** and **Brian Joseph (SP '72)**. One of them owned a Vespa, and when I needed an evening break from studying, I would motor up to the Acropolis, which was then easily accessible, where the full moon shone through the columns and only the barking of a stray dog or two broke the silence.

The school's mission at the time was to offer "a program of studies in Greek civilization." The faculty reflected this. My instructors were giants in classical studies. Judith Binder taught ancient Greek archaeology and H.D.F. Kitto ancient Greek language and Attic tragedy. A.R. Burns taught ancient Greek history and Franz Tritch, who earned his archaeological chops working with Sir Arthur Evans excavating Knossos, taught Asia Minor history. The faculty now is three times larger and much more diverse.

In the Greek countryside the cruel legacy of WWII was still evident. We passed through one Cretan town filled with widows dressed in black, the consequence of a cruel Nazi reprisal when all the

village men were shot. Some of our professors had first-hand experience with the war. Burns, for example, was head of British intelligence in Aleppo and one night a crew of Greek fishermen reported suspicious construction on Keros. He alerted High Command, and a team of saboteurs was dispatched to blow up what was the makings of a German heavy gun emplacement, later immortalized in a 1961 movie **The Guns of Navarone** starring Gregory Peck, David Niven, Anthony Quinn, and Irene Papas.

Travel to the islands was leisurely and uncrowded. The cruise ships and mega-yachts hadn't arrived yet. Early one Saturday morning, a schoolmate and I took the ferry from Mykonos to Delos to explore the ruins. I recall that the site was almost deserted and that the fields among the ruins were an explosion of red, blue, and

yellow flowers. In the afternoon, the winds picked up and the last ferry couldn't attempt the crossing to retrieve us. Then, as now, there were no accommodations on the island, but the warden kindly shared his dinner and told us to find a sheltered spot to sleep. We settled into a 3rd century BCE gymnasium next to the stadium and drank water from a basin that was replenished by percolating groundwater.

My semester at CYA marked the final years of the Junta of the Colonels. While we students weren't aware of the rampant repression and human rights abuses, some incidents were very public, like the bombing of the American Cultural Center and general economic malaise. Also, in the grim military spirit of the times, the Junta had banned plate throwing and its exuberant variations like tearing of shirts in tavernas. We male students wore our hair short so as not to be labeled as submissive hippies. A New York Times article printed at the time commented that Athens "looks like a cemetery that's no way to have fun." So, my return to CYA after 50 years allowed me the opportunity to gauge how things had changed. I felt like a living fossil. The staff was very welcoming and clearly proud of their new facilities, location, and growth. The halls were filled with excited students experiencing their first week of classes. Its curriculum has expanded to include STEM courses, business, communication, and international relations. Who could ask for a better geographical location that touches three continents: Europe, Africa, and Asia. Also, dear to any parent, Greece remains a safe and nonmacho environment, a situation which might account for its 3 to 1 female /male ratio, up from 2 to 1 during my time. Athens was bustling with energy, so different from the 1970s when tourists

spent a brief 24 hours in the city before heading to the islands.

How did CYA influence the trajectory of my professional career?

Upon completing my studies, I traveled overland through Turkey, Iran, and Afghanistan to visit some of the historical sites that **Professor Tritsch** had described. I traveled by local bus and stayed in small towns, something absolutely unthinkable now. Later, I used my anthropology skills during a four-year Peace Corps deployment in a Sherpa area of Nepal and as Manager of International Operations for Hershey, a position that took me to many of the major cocoa growing regions - all third world countries - around the world. In short, CYA allowed me to learn from the past respectfully and this helped me to shape my future responsibly.



COOKING CLASSICS 101

Melomakarona (Christmas Honey Cookies)



Ingredients:

For the syrup

500 g water 800 g granulated sugar 150 g honey 3 stick(s) cinnamon 3 whole cloves 1 orange, cut in half

1st mix 400 g orange juice

400 g seed oil 180 g olive oil

50 g icing sugar 1/2 teaspoon(s) ground cloves 2-3 teaspoon(s) cinnamon 1/4 teaspoon(s) ground nutme 1 teaspoon(s) baking soda orange zest, of 2 oranges

2nd mix

1 kilo all-purpose flour 200 g semolina, fine

To Serve

Honey, walnuts

Instructions

- Preheat the oven to 190* C (370*F) set to fan.
- To make the cookies, you need to prepare 2 separate mixtures.
- For the first mixture, add all of the ingredients in a large bowl. Mix, using a hand whisk.
- In a separate bowl, add all of the ingredients for the second mixture.
- Combine the first and second mixture.

• Mix by hand, very gently and for a very short time (10 seconds at the most). If you mix longer, the mixture will split or curdle.

- Mold cookie dough into oval shapes, 3-4 cm in length, 30 g each. Try to keep them as similar as possible.
- Bake for about 20-25 minutes, until they are crunchy and golden brown.
- As soon as you remove them from the oven, soak the hot cookies in the syrup for 10 seconds.
- Allow them to drain on a wire rack.
- Drizzle with honey and chopped walnuts.


Sofia Novak (SP '23)


Anna Tulenko (FA '22)


Himmelhoch, Leah, ed. *Aeschylus: Agamemnon*. Greek Texts Series. London: Bloomsbury Academic, 2023.

This accessible edition for students brings the *Agamemnon*, Aeschylus' opening play in the Oresteia trilogy, to life for first-time readers. A hugely popular play in antiquity and with a rich reception history to the present day, this is an essential play for students of classics, drama and the canon of western literature.

Dalby, Andrew, and Rachel Dalby. *Gifts of the Gods: A History of Food in Greece. Foods and Nations.* London: Reaktion Books, 2018.



Gifts of the Gods takes us into the beyond the taverna to offer a unique and comprehensive history of the food of Greece. Andrew and Rachel Dalby discuss how the land was first settled, what was grown, and how certain fruits, herbs and vegetables became a part of local cuisines. Moving through prehistorical and classical Greece, and the Roman, Byzantine and Ottoman empires, they explore the




country's regional food identities as well as the export of Greek food to communities all over the world, culminating with a look at one of the most distinctive features of Greece's food tradition: the country's worldrenowned hospitality. Illustrated throughout and featuring traditional recipes that blend historical and modern flavours, Gifts of the Gods is a mouthwatering account of a rich and ancient cuisine.

Alexandratos, Michael. *Queerbetika: Queering Rebetika*. Cycladic Press, 2023.

"Queerbetika" is a term used to describe the queering of the genre of rebetika – an urban Greek popular song genre from the late 19th century to the 1950s – through academic or creative interventions. This zine explores queerness and homosexuality in rebetika through its exponents, sites of performance, gay supporters and song lyrics.

This is the first study and anthology in either Greek or English to investigate such an important but overlooked theme in the field of rebetology.

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
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Honoring a legacy: The William C. Kontes '99 Memorial

The William C. Kontes '99 Memorial Scholarship, established in 2021 by **Zoë Kontes (FY '95)**, stands as a tribute to William C. This initiative reflects his remarkable life, empowering CYA students with opportunities to grow academically and personally.



Since its inception, the scholarship has achieved remarkable strides, raising more than half a million dollars through 99 contributions from 71 donors. These collective efforts have established an endowment fund with a sustainable strategy, generating approximately 4-5% annual returns. This income ensures the scholarship will continue to support CYA students for years to come. Over \$25,000 has already been awarded to two deserving students, setting a precedent for future recipients. Recently, a long-term allocation plan was approved by CYA's Board of Trustees, dedicating at least \$8,000 per semester to support ambitious, goal-oriented individuals who embody Will's spirit and commitment to excellence. By honoring Will's legacy, the scholarship not only transforms lives but also strengthens the community of alumni and donors who make this possible.

Dr. Peter Green (1924–2024)

It is with deep sadness that we inform you of the passing of **Dr. Peter Green** on September 16, at the age of 99, just three months before his 100th birthday. Dr. Green was an exceptional scholar, a prolific author, and a faculty member at CYA from the fall of 1966 to the spring of 1971. During his time at CYA, he taught Greek Literature (in translation), Greek History, and Advanced Latin. His last course, when he returned briefly in the spring of 1999, focused on Herodotus and the Persian Wars. He was an Advisor Emeritus of the school.

CYA played an important role in his life. In a November 2003 interview with the Classical Association of Iowa's AMICI, Dr. Green shared:

"So there we were in Greece [...] and I was looking for a job. **Ismene Phylactopoulos**, the guiding spirit of College Year in Athens (still the best of the junior year abroad programs), needed a lecturer in Greek literature and, later, history. By this improbable route I got lured back into teaching classics at tertiary level, and found that with American students I loved it. And, I was told, was good at it. I taught just about everything in Athens, from Greek archaic history to the satires of Juvenal, from 1966-71."

Born in England, Peter Green served in the Intelligence Corps during World War II before pursuing his studies at Cambridge University. Following the war, he embarked on a successful career in England as both a journalist and historical fiction writer. In the 1960s, he lived with his family in Greece, before accepting a professorship at the University of Texas at Austin in 1971. Upon retirement, Dr. Green and his wife Carin, a CYA alumna, moved to Iowa City, where she joined the Classics Department. During this time, he continued his academic contributions by teaching courses in History and Classics and serving as editor of Syllecta Classica, the journal of the Iowa Classics Department.

Dr. Green's contributions to the field of Classics were extensive. His celebrated works include Alexander of Macedon, 356–323 B.C.: A Historical Biography (1974), Ovid: The Poems of Exile: Tristia and the Black Sea Letters (1994), The Poems of Catullus (2005), The Hellenistic Age: A Short History (2007), The Iliad by Homer (2015), and The Odyssey by Homer (2018). At the time of his passing, he was finalizing a translation and commentary on Herodotus' Histories. This important work will be published by the University of California Press in 2025.

Dr. Peter Green leaves behind an extraordinary legacy. His contributions to the fields of Classics and History will continue to inspire future generations. He will be greatly missed by all who knew him.
